The following applications have been received and the Committee is required to make a decision on the awarding of grants based on the current criteria.

The annual budget is £24,000 and there is £20,663 remaining for the financial year 2021/2022. This is the third meeting of a four-meeting cycle.

Wiltshire Sight	£2,160	<p>The money requested will pay for our monthly community hub in Chippenham for 12 months.</p> <p>There is estimated to be around 1600 people living with sight loss in Chippenham. We are seeking funding towards our Community Sight Loss Advice Service in Chippenham to enable us to continue and build on our valuable work in Chippenham for those residents living with sight loss, with increased focus this year on building connections in the community and helping people to re-connect through peer support groups, befriending, and accessible social and sporting opportunities. We will hold our monthly local community hub in Chippenham where people can drop in or make appointments to see their Community Sight Loss Advisor, try out equipment, or get support as needed alongside our regular peer support social groups. Peer support makes such a difference to mental wellbeing, because as well as 'having someone to talk to', people gain confidence and purpose by supporting others.</p> <p>Our Sight Loss Assessment explores how people are coping in all areas of their life. We create a plan with people helping them progress towards their goals. We measure their progress, recording outcomes to make sure we know we are making a difference in people's lives. After our initial support, we continue to be there by holding support hubs in local community spaces across the county and continuing to provide a full range of practical and emotional support. Our Sight Loss Advisors are local and know the challenges and support available. We show people a range of innovative technology to find the right tools for them and their sight loss, training people to use items effectively, maximising any remaining sight that they have.</p>	YES

		<p>We are very proud that we've continued to deliver support throughout the pandemic. However, in spite of our efforts, our clients are still amongst the most isolated and vulnerable in our communities. We have adapted our services e.g. supporting people to use technology, and we are now looking forward to responding to the challenges of society reopening, and ensuring that people with sight loss aren't left behind. After a year of isolation for so many, there is a huge need to help people gain confidence leaving home. We are also very concerned that people have postponed eye health checks due to needing to isolate or shield. We believe that there will be a significant jump in new diagnoses and sadly a marked deterioration of people's sight conditions emerging over the next twelve months. We will help more people to reach their full potential by supporting them as soon as they are diagnosed, and regularly when their sight deteriorates and needs change. Sight loss is the only life-changing diagnosis that is made on the high street, and people desperately need practical and emotional support at this time.</p>

3.0 FEEDBACK FROM PREVIOUS GRANT RECIPIENTS

3.1 Chippenham Hospital Radio - Grant Awarded July 2021 for £1,937

I am writing on behalf of all the volunteers at Chippenham Hospital Radio to say a huge thank you to everyone at Chippenham Council for generously supporting our work with a £1,937.49 funding donation.

We have purchased all of the equipment necessary for outside broadcasts and its first outing is now likely to be the Charity Day at The Neeld Community and Arts Centre in December. Next year it is anticipated that this equipment will be used for a number of community events, including those organised by other Chippenham charities who would wish to make use of our services free of charge.

Once again, many thanks for your help and support.

3.2 Chippenham Men's Shed - Grant Awarded April 2020 for £2,000

The donation given was for IT equipment in order to help our members get online and teach computer skills. Due to the pandemic this was delayed until August 2021, the funds were spent on two laptops including software of a total cost of £2,043.15.

3.3 Springboard - Grant Awarded August 2020 for £1,960

The grant was spent from July 2020 to August 2021 and used primarily towards staff salaries to support the volunteer/student placements.

The difference the funding made:

- Helped to ensure Springboard stayed open during the uncertain financial times of the pandemic, allowing Springboard to continue to support the children and families.
- Funding was received when there was a real fight for survival, due to the cancellation of planned fundraising events.
- Enabled Springboard to offer work experience placements during the pandemic.
- Enabled longer placements with more hours for two special needs volunteers.

Successes:

- Springboard continued to deliver its service and meet its objectives, which is to be celebrated.
- Parents continued to receive valuable support and signposting during the pandemic.
- Springboard responded to Government guidance and was able to provide safe volunteer/student work experience placements.

3.4 Kandou Arts - Grant Awarded August 2020 for £2,000

We asked for funding to cover 20 weeks of funding to provide mentoring and support to drop ins.

The delivery was of course interrupted by lockdowns and was delivered in interrupted bursts according to access to offices for drop in for young people. A brief snapshot of the profile of the dominant users of the service and feedback from participants on can be found in **APPENDIX B**.

We have ensured that each of the young people who have used drop in hours have had access to a meal, arts and crafts and music resources.

With funding and opportunity for these young people so rare it is a real joy to be able to provide this additional and much needed support.

We have exceeded the number of hours we were to deliver and we hope that during this very different period in all our delivery and provision that we can continue to offer support and solace for these young people by whatever means.

Thank you so much for your continued support.

Participant feedback:

“Since I haven't had any funding to attend Kandu arts I have been doing drop ins where I stop by and help with the community for a couple of hours.

“The Kandu community is so important to me because it helps me to be who I am. It helps me with what I want from my future, helping people. All of it gives me so much confidence and pride”

"Kandu arts is a place where I can share my emotions, it's somewhere I feel safe in a sometimes lost world and helps me with who I am. It's my freedom place to be myself."

"I like being able to drop into kandu because I know that I'll be welcomed and not turned away at any times"

"Could write 100 of pages on how much ur team supports me ur like a family ur amazing and u don't get enough credit for it!"

It was really useful for me to be able to drop into kandu because for me it's a safe place and they all treat you so nicely they give you the support you need and there is always something to do! I would come to kandu every day if I had the chance"

"I find it very beneficial to go to kandu. Kandu has been my family when my own family haven't. They've seen me through both my educational and emotional struggles. They've helped me to achieve things I never thought possible and pursue career interests I would have never pursued on my own. I feel closer to many of the facilitator's there than my own parents and friends. Everyone at Kandu has played an extremely important role in my life whether it was helping me revise for my GCSEs or saying kind words about my art (even when my art deserved none) going to Kandu is one of the best decisions I have ever made and will continue to affect the path my life takes for years to come."

"I like being able to go to some of the stuff at Kandu as I know people and I don't like to be around strangers and it's more structured. I think I've got better at being with other people and I can come out without thinking I will be bullied by anyone. It made me more aware of what's going on around me"

8.0 RECOMMENDATIONS
